Councillor's Corner

This time of year, we realise how valuable shade trees are to our community and wildlife. As part of the Greening Gosnells: Our Public Tree Strategy introduced last year, the City of Gosnells committed to planting at least 2,500 trees in public spaces each year. We also want to encourage residents to join in the effort at their own properties. In addition to providing food and shelter for native wildlife, trees improve shade and lower the surrounding air temperature, making life more comfortable in our suburbs.

Another way you can support our local wildlife and environment is to ensure your cat is kept indoors, or in a secure cat run. Cats are responsible for much more destruction of wildlife than many owners realise and also cause nuisance to neighbours. The State Government's Cat Act 2011 requires all cats to be sterilised, registered and microchipped, and the City has identified Cat Prohibited areas to protect areas of environmental significance.

Let's all work together to improve our local environment, which will make living in the City even more enjoyable and comfortable.
