Holling Street park ready for play

With a resident's artwork as its centrepiece and a design influenced by those who live nearby, the new-look Holling Street Reserve is a true celebration of community.

The Maddington park is now open, after several months of construction, providing local kids with a great new space to scoot, skate, run and play.

Mayor Glenn Dewhurst said the City was particularly pleased with the result, saying this project was a fantastic improvement and represented the City's long-term vision to revitalise its parks and public spaces.

"The City's Public Open Space Strategy enables the City to use funds from the sale of under-used land to redevelop parks like Holling Street, which had outdated equipment and a design that wasn't suited to our changing community."

During consultation, residents asked the City to keep the existing large asphalt area which also needed an upgrade. A community art competition was held to find a locally-inspired design, won by Will Schofield and his snake-influenced artwork. The rest of the 1.9ha site was inspired by the 1950s style of housing surrounding the park and includes feature seat walls, a shaded playground, barbecue, shelter, lighting and a basketball half-court.

A free community event with sausage sizzle, bouncy castle and a screening of the family friendly, feel-good movie *A Dog's Purpose* will launch the new-look park from 5.30pm to 8.30pm this Friday. For details, visit the City's website.

New eyes on the street in Gosnells Town Centre

A key initiative to improve community safety and address crime concerns in the Gosnells Town Centre will soon be delivered, with CCTV cameras being installed by the end of May. The 16 new cameras, which were part of the State Government's Local Projects, Local Jobs election commitment, will provide 'real time' eyes on the street, while giving Gosnells Police access to live and recorded footage. Camera systems will also be used at Jean Garvey Skate Park, Sutherlands Park and Ellis Brook Valley.

Recycle right – it's not all rubbish

Emerald Park begins

Work has begun at Emerald Park in Canning Vale to create a stunning new community space, with nature play and wetland boardwalks to bring people closer to nature.

A nature-based play area will be built alongside the existing playground, along with a path network, lighting and barbecue area. The \$700,000 project should be completed by spring.
