#### 1. BACKGROUND

While law and order and crime prevention are primarily the role of the State Government, the WA Police Force Annual Report 2016/17 suggests that community involvement is a necessary component of crime prevention strategies.

The City of Gosnells understands this, and further acknowledges that as the sphere of Government closest to the community, influencing many of the things that matter to how people live; Local Governments are well placed to assist in addressing community safety and crime prevention.

With this in mind, the City of Gosnells is committed to making the community a safer place for everyone. It recognises that community safety and crime prevention cannot be addressed by any single agency or organisation, and that to succeed, the whole community, including Council, residents, local businesses, State Government and Non-Government agencies must be involved. The City also acknowledges that public perceptions of community safety and crime are just as important as crime statistics and trends, and that feeling safe is a basic right for all.

Since 2001 the City of Gosnells has worked in partnership with WA Police Force Community Engagement Division (formerly the WA Police Force Strategic Crime Prevention), as part of the State Government's initiatives for improving community safety and reducing crime. This partnership has seen the development and delivery of a number of programs and initiatives which have helped make the community a safer and more welcoming place.

The 2014 – 2017 Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan recognised the work the City of Gosnells had done in the past in regards to community safety and security, and identified the issues that needed to be addressed. The plan also reinforced the partnership approach that needed to be taken to find solutions to such issues. Going forward, the City will continue to work in partnership with other key stakeholders to implement its 2018 – 2021 Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan; addressing key community safety and crime prevention concerns as identified by the community.

### 2. PURPOSE

The purpose of the City of Gosnells Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan is to guide the actions of the City and it's community safety partners over the next three years to improve community safety and reduce crime within the City of Gosnells.

The activities in the plan are informed by:

- The results of the Community Safety Survey carried out in 2017 which reviewed the community safety and crime prevention priorities from a community perspective;
- Local crime statistics and trends; and
- The City's 10 year Community Plan to ensure that the goals of the Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan align with the overarching goals of the Community Plan to make the City of Gosnells community a safer place.

The City of Gosnells Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan will deliver activities, programs and projects designed to address community priorities and current crime trends, and to achieve the goals of the Community Plan.

#### 3. CONSULTATION AND DEVELOPMENT

### 3.1 Developing the Plan

The Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan 2018-2021 was developed by the City of Gosnells, in consultation with:

- City of Gosnells residents;
- · City of Gosnells businesses;
- City of Gosnells community groups;
- Councillors; and
- WA Police Force.

This collaborative approach enabled the City to develop a comprehensive plan which addresses prominent and relevant community safety issues in the Gosnells area.

In addition to the knowledge and insight gained from community and stakeholder consultation, the City also used a number of key strengths and regular activities which ensure it is well-placed to adequately plan and facilitate community safety and crime prevention initiatives in the City of Gosnells. These include:

- Sound demographic knowledge of the community (socio-economic profile, diversity in age range, ethnicity, mobility, family structure, education and housing etc.);
- Strategic and tactical (operational) knowledge of the City and its environment;
- Analysis of the City's crime trends (2012/2017), using information provided by the WA Police Force Community Engagement Division;
- Analysis of crime statistics obtained from WA Police Force and Western Australian Local Government Association (WALGA);
- Assessment of specific locations and issues of primary concern:
- Demonstrated previous experience in developing and facilitating interventions and solutions; and
- Ongoing evaluation and adjustment of initiatives to achieve successful outcomes.

#### 3.2 Consultation methods

The City conducted a Community Safety Survey in 2017, which gave the community an opportunity to provide input into the City's crime and safety review. Respondents were asked a series of questions about how they felt in regards to levels of crime, contributing factors and possible solutions, as well as what they considered to be priority focus areas for crime prevention.

The survey was advertised in local newspapers and survey forms were sent via reply-paid mail to 50 randomly selected addresses in each suburb. The survey was available in all public City facilities. The community survey was also available for completion electronically via the City's free WiFi and on the City's website. To encourage input by people from non-English speaking backgrounds, William Langford Community House assisted clients to complete the survey. In total, 1,075 hard copy survey forms were distributed to various locations in the City. The total number of responses was 1,692. The key findings are outlined below (Section 4.1) and at Appendix 1.

In addition, anecdotal customer service feedback relating to community safety and crime prevention was considered when developing this plan.

#### 4. KEY FINDINGS


## 4.1 Feedback from surveys and consultation

Through its consultation and survey processes, the City determined the following:

- Home burglary, drug dealing/taking and anti-social behaviour were the greatest areas of priority that require addressing;
- Anti-social driver behaviour (hooning) and damage/vandalism were the next highest priority issues;
- The longer people lived in an area the more they felt crime had become a problem;
- The main places and times that people felt unsafe included areas after dark, train stations and parks / reserves;
- The community believed that to improve community safety, there needed to be more police and strengthening of law enforcement or penalties;
- Raising community awareness of crime prevention and community safety, strengthening relationships between people in neighbourhoods, lighting enhancements and improvements in the physical design of an area were also suggested as ways to improve community safety; and
- Many respondents attributed increases in crime to a lack of Police presence, resultant effects of drug and alcohol misuse within the community and a perceived lack of deterrent.

## 4.2 2012/17 Community Crime Trends

In developing the Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan, the City was also guided by WA Police Force data obtained from WALGA. Recorded City of Gosnells crime statistics from 2012 to 2017 are shown below.

City wide, offences recorded by WA Police Force show that theft and burglary are high volume crime areas, followed by drug offences. This is also demonstrated in the community safety survey feedback.

#### 4.3 Fear of Crime

The City has determined, through anecdotal feedback and conversations with members of the community and the WA Police Force, that the fear of crime is evident within the community. This has a negative impact on individuals and communities, detracting from quality of life and adversely impacting social and economic well-being.

Sometimes the fear people have is well-founded, but often the actual risk is less than perceived. The Community Safety Survey asked people how safe they felt living or working in the City of Gosnells and the results confirmed that many people in the community have a fear of crime. 31% of respondents stated that they felt somewhat unsafe, 27% were neutral and 21% felt somewhat safe. With this in mind, the City takes a holistic approach to safety programs and activities, targeting priority issues identified by survey results and crime statistics, and through programs which bring the community together to build community cohesion and celebrate community achievements.

#### 4.4 Focus areas / issues

Taking into account survey and consultation results, as well as the analysis of community crime trends and other anecdotal feedback, the City of Gosnells has identified the following key focus areas / issues for Community Safety and Crime Prevention:

- Home burglary;
- Theft;
- Anti-social behaviour;
- Reducing the fear of crime;

- Graffiti; and
- Improving lighting.

These focus areas/issues are based on findings from the City's consultation process. However, community safety and crime prevention activities will not necessarily be limited to these issues / areas. The City will continue to liaise with key stakeholders and community members to monitor and address any issues which emerge. For example, through its Seniors Services business unit, the City has received feedback that safety is a concern for seniors in the City of Gosnells. With this in mind, the City implements initiatives such as the Safer Seniors Audits program.

The City also acknowledges that increasing the number of Police was stated as the top priority in the Community Safety Survey. The City has no authority to influence Police numbers. However, it continues to work collaboratively with WA Police to identify key issues and implement suitable community initiatives.

#### 5. A COLLABORATIVE APPROACH

As previously stated, community safety and crime prevention activity is dependent upon participation and input by the community and a range of other stakeholders. The City's scope of collaboration includes:

- State Government bodies (e.g. WA Police Force Community Engagement Division, WA Police Force, WALGA, Department of Fire & Emergency Services, Department of Housing);
- Service providers (e.g. Gosnells District Neighbourhood Watch, Safety House Association, William Langford Community Centre, Constable Care Child Safety Foundation);
- Local Governments within the South East Metropolitan District;
- Local schools:
- Businesses:
- Media (particularly local media); and
- All community members taking an equal and inclusive approach that encourages participation from people from CaLD backgrounds, people with disability, families, and a range of age groups, from young people through to seniors.

Working in collaboration with these stakeholders will enable the City to plan and implement crime prevention and safety initiatives which involve the community, respond to community concerns and assist in building community capacity. Section 7 (Implementation Plan) details the programs and projects the City of Gosnells will undertake in partnership with a range of stakeholders in order to address the key focus areas and issues outlined previously.

The City of Gosnells is also committed to communication with the public and stakeholders about ongoing community safety and crime prevention initiatives. A full page insert called "LIFE in your City" features in the local paper on a monthly timeframe. This is used to promote programs that are contained within the plan, along with other local content. In addition, the City uses social media to keep the community informed about crime and community safety information and initiatives.

#### 6. REVIEW AND EVALUATION

The Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan is a working document that will be reviewed annually to enable reprioritisation of issues in response to community needs. All programs will be evaluated each year to ensure appropriate and efficient allocation of Council resources.

The City will ensure that up-to-date information is taken into account when reviewing the plan, by maintaining regular and ongoing contact with the community, the State Government and non-government agencies. The close relationship between the City and local Police will also ensure that emerging trends are identified and initiatives developed where the City has the capacity to assist. The City of Gosnells Safe City Initiative is responsible for reviewing and overseeing implementation of this Plan. Safe City staff members are involved in many community safety and crime prevention projects and maintain close links with the community through workshops, presentations and daily correspondence.

The City will use further community analysis of crime trends to monitor recorded crime changes and will assist in refocussing priorities where needed. Every three years the City conducts a community safety survey, which will be used to measure changes in community perceptions of crime in the Gosnells area.



#### 7. IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

The City's Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan has five objectives. The first four were originally developed by the State Government's Office of Crime Prevention (now the WA Police Force Community Engagement Division), and have been implemented in the City's Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plans in recent years. The fifth objective was added for the new Plan. It focuses on an internal City-wide approach to community safety.

Community Safety and Crime Prevention programs will be prioritised to address and reflect priority issues identified by the community, as well as issues demonstrated by statistical representation or research. For the years 2018 – 2021, most programs will focus on perception / fear of crime, burglary reduction, anti-social behaviour, graffiti and youth development / mentoring.

#### Introduction

The City of Gosnells Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan was reviewed to identify the ongoing community safety and crime prevention priorities to be addressed. The plan was developed with input from government agencies, community groups and feedback from the community itself.

- William Langford Community House




# **Respondent Profile**




The following table shows the number of responses received by suburb.




# 1. I believe that the crime rate in the City of Gosnells is:

The following table shows the responses received for Question 1:




The following table shows the responses to Question 1 by Age Group:




# 2. What are you basing your answer to Question 1 on?

The following table shows the responses received for Question 2:




# 3. If you have been a victim of crime/s or you have witnessed a crime did you report it to the Police?

# 4. If you selected No or Sometimes, please tell us why you did not report the incident to Police?




81% of respondents did not provide an answer to this question and 55% of respondents selected they had not been a victim of crime.

The following table shows the responses received for Question 5:




The following table shows the responses received for Question 5 by age group:




# 6. When compared to other local councils in the area do you believe that the City of Gosnells has less crime, about the same amount of crime, or more crime?

The following table shows the responses received for Question 6:




The following table shows the responses received for Question 6 by suburb:




# 7. How long have you lived or worked in the City of Gosnells?

The following table shows the responses received for Questions 7:




# 8. During the time that you have lived/worked in the City of Gosnells do you believe that crime is:

The following table shows responses to Questions 7 and 8 by Suburb:


















