## Message from the Mayor

As I travel through the local area I am pleased to see the many improvement and beautification works undertaken by the City of Gosnells over the past 12 months.

These important works are not only preparing our City for future growth, they are creating attractive and functional areas for people to enjoy.

For example major works, such as the dualling of Garden Street from Nicholson Road to Warton Road, are making the daily commute easier for many residents by easing traffic congestion and improving traffic flow. To complement road works, the City has undertaken significant landscaping along Nicholson Road and at the Corfield Street roundabout to add an attractive leafy finish.

Our parks and reserves are also being improved and remodelled for a new generation of users. There are places which cater for young families, the active and health conscious, or those who enjoy relaxing and calm spaces.

Stretton Way Reserve in Kenwick is a great example of how a park with previous limited use has been transformed. With new play areas, rubber safety surface, shade sails, native gardens and irrigated grass kick about space, the park has become a centre piece for the local community.

At a local level, residents can play their part in transforming our City by improving yards around homes, working together within their street and collectively beautifying their neighbourhood. The

recently launched, Great Front Yard Competition, will reward many residents who tidy front yards and improve the visual appeal of their street. The Great Front Yard Competition is just one of the new initiatives aimed at engendering pride in our City.

Continuing with the theme pride and belonging, the City's community programs are being embraced by people from all walks of life. City services and programs are regularly updated to address changing needs. One of the great success stories for 2012 was the Summer Events celebrations which showcased 10 events and attracted over 10,000 people. Plans are already underway for the return of Summer Events with a bumper program soon to be launched.

## Chief Executive Officer's report

I extend my thanks to the many community members who provided input or feedback which helped in shaping the City's new strategic direction document 'Our Future: Our 10 Point/10 Year Commitment', which sets our long term direction.

Council endorsed this strategy late last year and also adopted a four year corporate business plan, which sets the priorities for major projects for the near future.

These planning documents provide the basis for the City's decisions on infrastructure planning and service provision and are designed to ensure the City's sustainability while meeting the changing needs of new generations.

The City has been mindful to minimise the impact of rate rises on our community and through careful financial management, the City has been able to adopt a budget supporting many initiatives but with an average rate rise of 3.8% this year. I understand this is one of the lowest rate rises amongst all local governments in Western Australia.

Staff across the organisation have completed many significant projects during the past 12 months. There has been a focus on improving the capacity of several major roads through increasing lanes and improving road treatments, and also reducing flood risk through improved drainage maintenance practices.

In addition, the City has completed a number of significant park upgrades and major redevelopments, and successfully partnered with agencies to deliver innovative community programs. These are just a few of the achievements with many more detailed in this Annual Report.

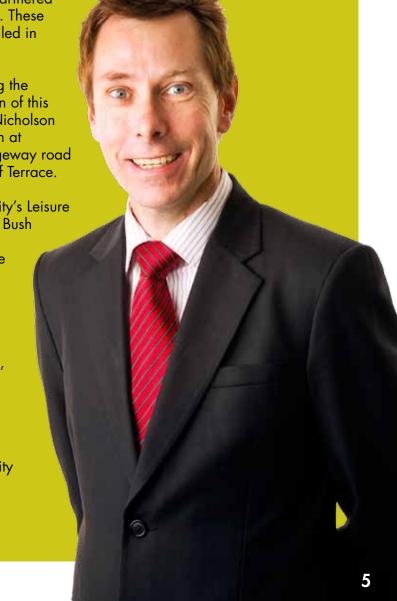
A comprehensive list of projects being undertaken during the coming 12 months also features in the Future Plan section of this document. These include upgrading the roundabout at Nicholson Road/Garden Street/Yale Road; traffic signal installation at Albany Highway/Gosnells Road West; and dual carriageway road works on Nicholson Road from Ranford Road to Clontarf Terrace.

Funds are also provided for building extensions to the City's Leisure World facility and construction of a new building for the Bush Fire Brigade/State Emergency Service Headquarters. In addition, feasibility and planning studies are listed as the first step in progressing other major projects which will occur in future years.

At all times we are mindful of the impact on residents and work towards minimising discomfort to those living or working near construction works. Our aim, as always, is to develop a better community for current and future generations.

In closing, I would like to thank the Councillors for their leadership and support and also the City's staff for their ongoing commitment and dedication to improving the City of Gosnells.

## City profile

## The City serves a population of more than 110,000 people

The City of Gosnells is located just 17 kms south east of the Perth CBD and includes the suburbs of Beckenham, Canning Vale, Gosnells, Huntingdale, Kenwick, Langford, Maddington, Martin, Orange Grove, Southern River, and Thornlie.

The City is the fifth largest local government in Western Australia and encompasses substantial rural zones in the east and south, and some commercial and industrial developments, particularly along the Albany Highway.

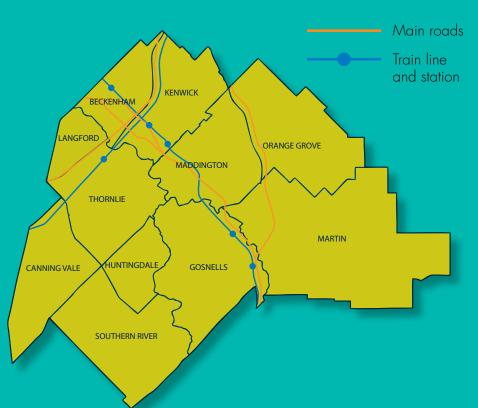
At present the population is estimated at more than 110,000 people, with annual growth projected at 1.59%.

Fuelling our growth is the availability of housing through new land releases and housing developments in Canning Vale and Southern River, while redevelopment is becoming a focus in the suburbs of Maddington, Beckenham, Kenwick and Gosnells.

Residents have access to 33 active recreational facilities, 255 passive reserves and 24 conservation reserves. The City manages 765 km of roads and 571 km of footpaths.

# Information management update

The City has an ongoing commitment to good records management practices and complies with the City's 2009 Recordkeeping Plan and *State Records Act 2000*.

In March 2012, the City implemented a successful upgrade to its information management system. Now known as Enterprise Content Management (ECM), extensive product testing and staff training enabled a smooth transition.

Regular training programs for new and existing staff are conducted with supporting material on recordkeeping practices and procedures available on the City's intranet.

A review of the City's onsite storage facilities resulted in the decommissioning of one area; all information from the location was appraised, managed and relocated to the City's offsite storage facility.

## Official conduct report

The *Local Government Act 1995* requires the City to report on the number of official conduct complaints recorded under Section 5.121 during a financial year.

The City of Gosnells received no complaints made under Section 5.121 of the *Local Government Act 1995* during this financial year.

## Access and inclusion

The City of Gosnells does not view disability as a barrier. Physical and attitudinal barriers to inclusion and access are being addressed.

The City's Disability Access and Inclusion
Plan aims to reduce the barriers which may

prevent people from fully participating in the local community.

Our commitment goes beyond legislative compliance, by incorporating access and inclusion initiatives into our daily work.



Significant access initiatives undertaken in 2011/12 include:

- Information on the accessibility of each City facility and building has been produced and is distributed with all booking hire forms.
- Disability Awareness Training was provided to all new staff during mandatory Corporate Induction sessions.
- The City's community events market research survey was updated to invite feedback from event attendees about ease of access to assist in event planning and optimise participation for all.
- Marketing materials developed to promote
   City events provided details of accessibility
   features at each venue. This included ACROD
   parking, hearing loops, accessible toilets
   and the companion card scheme.

## 2011/12 performance

A summary of some major City projects undertaken over the past 12 months is included below:

## Infrastructure and public spaces

 Lobby the State Government for provision of a railway station at Nicholson Road, and improvements to stations on the Armadale line.

**Status:** The City has initiated several articles and media stories to increase the prominence of this issue and to seek government support. The Transport Minister has indicated in correspondence that the Perth Transport Authority "will in the next few years be examining the requirements to extend the Thornlie Line."

In addition, the State Government has committed to a major upgrade of Beckenham Train Station. Maddington Train Station will also be receiving some minor upgrades.

 Develop and implement a Master Plan for the redevelopment of Mills Park.

**Status:** Design concepts have been prepared and are being reviewed to incorporate requested changes. A site meeting was held with the Department of Environment and Conservation to gain support for the project.

#### **Buildings and facilities**

 Review all City owned equestrian facilities and provide recommendations for their management and future improvement.

**Status:** Council has considered the equestrian grounds within the City and endorsed the recommendations of the Equestrian Needs Assessment, which included relocation of the Gosnells Archers Club Inc.

Subject to funding, the Gosnells Archers Club Inc will move from Orange Grove to a more suitable location in Sutherlands Park near Huntingdale Community Centre. As a result the Orange Grove site may be used for future equestrian pursuits. The Gosnells Archers Club Inc has welcomed this decision as archery has increased in popularity.

It is proposed that the Orange Grove Horse and Pony Club Inc, Gosnells Riding and Pony Club and Riding for the Disabled WA will co-locate at the Orange Grove Recreational Ground as a dedicated equestrian centre. All three organisations are being consulted regarding the site development which is likely to offer increased arenas (including one under cover), improved buildings, yards and parking.

#### Land use planning

 Subdivide, sell land and then improve the public open space at Streatham Street.

**Status:** An Urban Water Management Plan is being produced to enable the drainage design component of the development to be finalised.

 Implement the Local Housing Strategy to rezone land and facilitate increased residential densities.

**Status:** Two amendments to the City's Planning Scheme have been finalised to allow development at higher densities in certain parts of the City. Additionally, a reduction in the detailed planning requirements for certain areas has been introduced.

 Rezone land in Maddington and Kenwick for industrial use.

Status: The Metropolitan Region Scheme Amendment for Precinct 1 has been advertised and the public comment period has concluded. A Water Management Strategy for Precincts 2 and 3 is being commissioned.

 Facilitate redevelopment of the Maddington Town Centre.

**Status:** Technical studies to support the development of a Structure Plan are complete and the Structure Plan is being drafted.

## Future plans

The City has a range of significant major projects planned for the coming 12 months. Major projects for 2012/13 include:

## Infrastructure and public spaces

- Lobby the State Government for provision of a railway station at Nicholson Road, and improvements to stations on the Armadale line.
- Develop and implement a Master Plan for the redevelopment of Mills Park.
- Redevelop Rede Street Reserve.
- Commence the process to subdivide, sell land and improve public open space at the Streatham Street Reserve, Robinson Park and Charles Hook Park.
- Redevelop existing parks at Belfast Close Reserve, Yilgarn Way Reserve and Limbee Glade Reserve.
- Upgrade the roundabout to reduce congestion at Nicholson Road/Garden Street/Yale Road intersection.
- Improve the median strip and verges on Warton Road.
- Extend the dual carriageway on Nicholson Road from Ranford Road to Clontarf Terrace.
- Install traffic signals at the intersection of Albany Highway and Gosnells Road West.

#### **Buildings and facilities**

- Extend the existing Leisure World gym, construct three multi-purpose community rooms and install new universal access automatic doors.
- Replace carpet and refurbish theatre chairs at the Don Russell Performing Arts Centre.
- Establish a co-located equestrian facility at Orange Grove.
- Construct a new building for the Bush Fire Brigade/ State Emergency Service Headquarters.
- Conduct a feasibility study for the establishment of a Waste Transfer Station on the City's former tip site on Kelvin Road.

#### Land use planning

- Rezone land in Maddington and Kenwick for industrial use.
- Facilitate redevelopment of the Maddington Town Centre.
- Undertake actions to support implementation of the Local Housing Strategy.

- Facilitate development in the Central Maddington area.
- Facilitate development of the Southern River Precincts 1 and 3.
- Establish an Improvement Plan for the Gosnells Town Centre.
- Develop City owned land in Southern River for commercial activities.
- Establish a strategy to guide land use and development in the Gosnells foothills.

#### **Community programs**

- Provide e-book options for library users.
- Implement the Eat, Act, Live Program.
- Provide a range of community events and celebrations.
- Implement the Str8 Talk'n
   Program. Funding for this
   program to run for three years

DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2012

Statement of comprehensive income

The Actual Net Result of \$19,667,113 for the year ended 30 June 2012 is \$6,206,514 below the Net Result for 2010/2011. This is primarily due to the Profit on Disposal of Assets as a result of a large subdivision in 2010/2011.

The Net Result of \$19,667,113 reflects the change in net assets, meaning the increase in value of assets deployed or ready to deploy in order to meet the City's objectives to increase ratepayer amenities.

Total Revenue of \$94,809,950 for the year ended 30 June 2012 is \$3,626,229 below the 2010/2011 revenue. The variance is primarily due to the Profit on Disposal of Assets from a large subdivision in 2010/2011. Total Revenue is comprised of Operating revenue, Non-Operating revenue and Profit on Disposal of Assets.

Total Expenses of \$75,142,837 is \$2,580,285 greater than the 2010/2011 actual expenses. This variance is primarily due to an increase in Employee costs and Other Expenditure. Total Expenses is comprised of Operating expenses, Finance Costs and Loss on Disposal of Assets.

Total Other Comprehensive Income of \$334,681,559 has resulted from a revaluation of the City's Road and Footpath assets and is a non cash revenue item.

DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2012

## Statement of financial position

Overall Equity has increased during the 2011/2012 financial year by \$354,348,672 to \$833,738,427. This primarily results from the changes to the Asset Revaluation Reserve as a result of the Roads and Footpaths revaluation.

Current Assets as at 30 June 2012 have increased by \$12,752,607 compared to 2010/2011, with an increase to Cash and Cash Equivalents of \$12,797,581 to \$82,646,235.

Current Liabilities as at 30 June 2012 have decreased by \$758,481 to \$18,697,400 compared to 2010/2011 primarily resulting from a reduction in trade and other payables.

DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2012

#### Statement of cash flows

The overall impact on the cash position at the close of the financial year is an increase of \$12,797,581 to \$82,646,235. This is principally as a result of an increase in cash flow from Operating Activities and a decrease in cash flows from Financing Activities.

Net Cash provided by Operating Activities of \$20,047,520 reflects an increase of \$1,820,668 compared to 2010/2011.

Net cash from Investing Activities has decreased by \$14,702,649 compared to 2010/2011 as a result of the sale of land from a large subdivision in 2010/2011.

Net Cash used in Financing Activities has decreased by \$15,415,405 compared to 2010/2011 chiefly due to debt repayment funded from a large subdivision in 2010/2011.

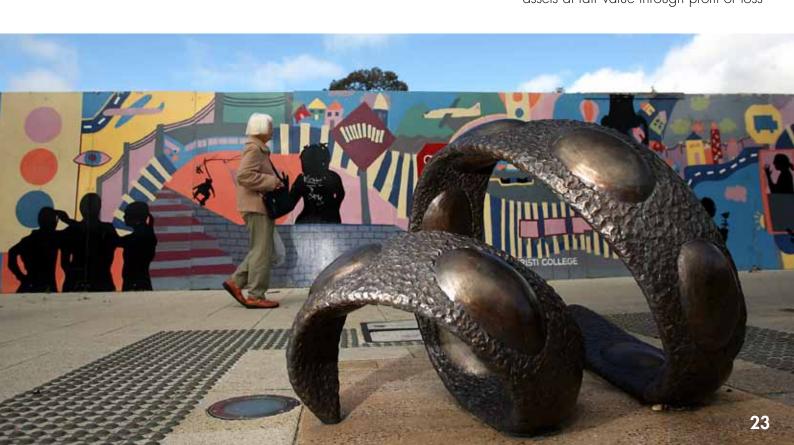
